Reduced Saturday & Holiday Service With 2 Crescent City Local Routes

Currently, RCTA runs the same level of service on Saturdays as during weekdays which is highly unusual. This will reduce service from 4 routes to 2 in Crescent city on Saturdays and Minor Holidays.

Route 4 (Gold) and either Route 1 (Blue) or Route 2 (Red) will operate on hourly frequencies all day, interlined at the Cultural Center. Routes 3 and 1 or 2 will not operate.

Elimination of first and last 30 minutes of service on Crescent City Local Routes & DAR

Crescent City Local Routes and DAR (1-4, Blue, Red, Green, and Gold) will begin service at 7am (rather than 6:30am) and end service at 7pm (rather than 7:30pm) Monday through Friday. Saturday will operate 8am to 7pm.

Ridership numbers sampled during these two half-hour periods of time were the lowest in the service day. Persons wishing to provide further comment on these service reductions are invited to attend the RCTA Board of Directors Meeting on Wednesday, June 21 at 3pm at the Del Norte County Administration (Flynn) Building.

RCTA has only modest reserve funds and even these strategic service cuts outlined in this brochure will also require reserve funds to be tapped to survive Fiscal Year 2017/18, depleting the reserves by 33%.



Why are these changes happening?

Redwood Coast Transit, like most public transit agencies, relies on a mix of local, state and federal funding. Unfortunately, one of RCTA's key federal funding sources has been unexpectedly slashed coming into Fiscal Year 2018 (July 2017-June 2018).

In addition, RCTA is responsible for ensuring that its routes are meeting the needs of the communities it serves, meaning that enough passengers are using each route, and that duplicative routes are avoided. Routes should be adjusted if ridership drops over time, which it has on most of these routes.

Will these routes/hours be reinstated in the future?


Redwood Coast Transit is hopeful that this "glitch" in federal funding is limited to this coming fiscal year. If funding is restored to previous levels, trips will be added back in to make a better, more usable network.

Summary of July 2017 Service Changes (Changes Effective July 1, 2017)

- Telephone support will cease at 5pm daily saving on dispatching staffing costs.
- 2. Route 10 will be eliminated due to duplication with Route 20.
- 3. Route 20 will be modified (2x per day) to add service into Klamath Glen replacing Route 10.
- 4. Saturday Service will be streamlined by removing 2 of the Crescent City local routes, saving one bus all day.
- 5. A new Holiday Service platform will be established for service on minor holidays. The Holiday Service will mimic the new Saturday Service platform.
- 6. The first half hour and last half hour of daily Crescent City Local bus routes will be eliminated. Service will run 7am to 7pm M-F, and 8am to 7pm on Satudays.




Route 10 Replaced by Route 20 Eliminates Duplication
